Chairman's Message



Dear Investors,

On behalf of the Board of Directors, it is my pleasure to present the Annual Report and Audited Accounts of the company for the year ended 31st March 2015.

Sector Outlook

Finance companies and specialized leasing companies sector showed improving performance in 2014 through the business and financial recovery process that started in the recent years. The assets of the sector grew at healthy rate of 18.9% in 2014 as a result of low interest rate regime. (Despite the increase in the volume of NPLs by 19.9%, the NPL ratio increased only marginally to 6.9% from 6.7% in 2013.)

The assets and liabilities in the sector underwent a re-pricing process with low interest rate regime causing the net interest margin to increase to 8% from 6.6% in 2013. Domestic financial markets continued to remain liquid and active during 2014.

The financial sector consolidated programme through banks and finance companies and specialized leasing companies regulated by the Central Bank was a major regulatory policy implemented during 2014. Given several concerns raised on the process, the programme was put on hold pending reviews by the committee appointed by the new government. The consolidation programme had a negative impact on growth potential of your company. The decision by the Government to remove the Value

Added Tax from Lease rentals of brand new cars with effect from 1st January 2015 had a positive impact on the Leasing sector.

Special attention is required to upgrade the SME sector in line with the overall development strategy of the country. A viable and dynamic SME sector, which encompasses agriculture, industry and services sectors, plays a pivotal role in an economy by creating employment, gearing income, alleviating poverty, thereby supporting inclusive growth. However, in Sri Lanka the full potential of SME sector is yet to be tapped due to the existence of a several constraints such as lack of access to financing, human resource capabilities and technological capabilities.

Global Economic Outlook

The global growth in 2014 was lower than initially expected with noticeable deviation across major economies and lower growth momentum in emerging economies. Global inflation remained subdued in 2014. Global crude oil prices edged lower in 2014. The global growth is expected to remain moderate while anticipated interest rate hike in US and low inflation in some advanced economies raising additional challenges. The forecast growth in India is 7.5% which is higher than the forecast growth rate for China which is 6.8%. The forecast for developing Asia is 6.6%.

Macro-Economic Outlook

The Sri Lankan economy is expected to register a sustainable growth path in the medium term, with a real GDP

growth of 7% in 2015 and an average growth of 7.8% over 2016-2018. Sri Lanka's expected graduation to the upper middle income status in terms of per capita GDP would place the country among a new group of peers. The conduct of monetary policy will be aimed at maintaining inflation in a range of 3%-5% on average while facilitating the expansion of economic activity.

Delivering Performance

We are also happy to inform you that your company has taken great strides forward and is now getting ahead with significant momentum. We truly believe that our customers are at centre-stage in our business and it is their unwavering patronage that has enabled our results. We will continue to build constructive customer partnerships that will be the cornerstone of our business drive.

During the year, we delivered strong performance, incremental growth and earnings growth across all categories compared to the previous year.

During the period under review Company recorded an Operating Profit before Taxes and Net Profit of LKR. 40.3 million and LKR. 28.9 million respectively.

Company's lending portfolio which is comprised of Lease, Hire Purchase and Loans of the company stood at LKR. 737 million. Total asset base of the company surpassed the LKR. 1 billion mark by the end of the financial year by reaching LKR. 1.04 billion and Shareholder's funds reached LKR. 648.1 million. As a result to the 22% increase of the Portfolio value, Company generated an interest income of LKR. 168 million which has seen a growth rate of 32%, while Company's other operating income stood at LKR. 5.6 million which is mainly comprised of income from Real Estate operations which has a growth rate of 198% compared to previous year.

We move forward with great optimism and are keen to gain the most from a promising environment.

Good Governance

The policies of better governance and transparency, as announced by the government, are key catalysts in the process of economic development, and therefore must be encouraged. Company continued to improve the governance and risk structures in Financial Year 2014/15, in a bid to Companies perspective of risk, regulation and compliance. We continued to report to the Central Bank of Sri Lanka in every sphere of the regulatory requirements.

Appreciations

I would like to express my appreciation to the Governor of the Central Bank of Sri Lanka and the officials at the Department of Supervision of Non-Bank Financial Institutions, for the support at all times. I take this opportunity to thank my colleagues on the Board and I also wish to express my appreciation to the Chief Executive Officer, the Management and Employees at all levels for their dedication and commitment in driving the success of the company. Finally, I thank our customers, shareholders and all other stakeholders of Ideal Finance Limited, for their continued confidence and trust in the company.

Chief Executive Officer's Message



Review of Operations

The financial sector performance in 2014 showed a momentum moderately higher than that in 2013 without causing any major macro-prudential concerns. Meanwhile, a number of regulatory policies introduced in 2014 further strengthened the risk management and public confidence in the financial sector. Leasing Finance Company (LFC) and Specialised Leasing Company (SLC) sector, which represented 7% of Sri Lanka's financial system, has also played a vital role in the financial sector.

2014 was a challenging year due to lower demand for credit in Leasing and Hire Purchase segments, the narrowing of margins and rising NPL ratios. The Company concluded the year under review with a net profit of LKR. 28.9mn.

Performance

The 2014/15 financial period marked another year of robust growth for Ideal Finance Limited by earning an income of LKR. 175 mn for the year ended 31st March 2015, which marks an increase of 34% over the previous year's income of Rs. 131 mn. Other Operating income increased significantly by 106% to LKR.5.6 mn which is mainly comprise of income from Real Estate Operations. Leasing and Hire Purchase have a growth rate of 22% to LKR. 737 mn. Asset base of the Company surpassed the LKR. 1 bn milestone by reaching LKR. 1.04 bn by end of March 2015 against the previous year's LKR. 885 mn.

We continued to strengthen our asset quality and placed great emphasis on credit and asset management where non-performing advances decreased to LKR. 2.1 mn from LKR. 2.4 mn and the NPL ratio was only 0.97% where as the industry average is 6.9%.

We did not open new branches during 2014/15 but we focused on increasing the performances of the existing branches. Branch revenue increased by 92% compared to previous year and the best performing branch based on profit was Kurunegala. It's profit increased by 100% to LKR. 1,2 mn from LKR. 0.6 mn last year.

The company possesses an impressive portfolio of customer assets amounting to Rs.737 mn currently, staying focused on its core target group of SMEs. The SME sector is widely considered to be the backbone of the Sri Lankan economy and is being prioritised as a key sector that will be the engine of growth to spur grassroots economic resurgence in the nation. We have a wide range of investors in Agriculture, Manufacturing, Tourism, Transport and Services sectors and we focus on the SME sector.

Though IFL would not focus much on mass marketing&promotions, it will be using such strategies in a selective manner to get the maximum output through such promotions. IFL's focus on micro, small and medium entrepreneurs would be further strengthened

Optimum use of our investments will be ensured by maintaining strict financial discipline right throughout our operations. IFL will objectively analyze the financial risk associated in all our investments and take a calculated risk in our business operations. Further, treasury management will be given high priority.

The investments in human resources have been utilized with increasing productivity compared to previous year to achieve the growth of the business volume and resultant growth in revenue and profitability. The quality of branch teams have been strengthened to generate higher volumes in all products. With a relatively small staff, we were able to serve our customers fulfilling their financial needs. We are now planning to expand the network of branches to achieve our growth plans.

The Finance Sector Consolidation programme 2014 has come to a standstill and it had a negative impact on company growth potential.

Towards the Future

We believe that the current momentum in the economic front will continue in the foreseeable future and will continue to provide a positive environment for the Financial Services industry to grow. Our plans to establish in existing market

segment and penetrate into new market segments with a planned geographical expansion will provide us a stronger platform to contribute to the growth of the national economy and at the same time to reap benefits from such growth. We will endeavor to optimize the performance of the Company to provide a fair share of the returns to all stakeholders.

Appreciations

I take this opportunity to thank the Chairman and the Board of Directors for their dynamic direction and guidance provided to me and to my team. The achievement in the past year is a team effort. It is the dedication and persevering efforts of the Ideal Finance team that made us a winning combination. I thank all the team members for the wonderful contributions made.

Management Discussion & Analysis

Global Economy

Global growth is expected to remain moderate, weighed down by high debt, unemployment and low investment according to the IMF. Additional challenges are raised due to the anticipated interest rates hikes in the US and low inflation in some advanced economies. The global growth rate in 2014 was 3.4% and is expected to rise to 3.5% in 2015, supported by the gradual recovery in advanced economies and sharp decline in oil price.

The inclusion of emerging economies such as Brazil, India, China, Mexico and South Africa within the fold of G20 reflects the changing economic as well as political weight of emerging economies in the global economy.

A major impulse to global growth has come from the United States annual growth in 2014 was above trend at about 2.75% (IMF,WEO). Overall, economic growth in the euro area was only 1.2% in 2014 and is expected to rise to 1.5% in 2015.

The China's growth remained broadly unchanged at about 7.5% in 2014, only a modest decline from 2012–13.

Growth is also expected in the Middle East and North Africa region.

Sri Lankan Economy

The Sri Lankan economy is now firmly on a path of economic transformation. Sources of growth in recent years have been largely dominated by the domestic non-tradable sector. Attracting more and better FDI becomes especially important for a country like Sri Lanka with a low level of domestic savings and weak public finances. If there is one overarching feature of the shifts in economics, geopolitics and society in the 21st century, It is the rise of the Asia. But the rise of Asia is by no means a foregone conclusion; many factors will influence the future trajectory of this rise. Sri Lanka must accept that strict replication of industrial policies of the type used in East Asia economies would be problematic today. Sri Lanka needs to identify key urban areas into which industries and FDI can be channeled, and build

the energy, housing, and environmental management infrastructure around it. Sri Lanka cannot forget that it lies in an enviable geographical location that connects this rising Asia with the rest of the world.

In 2014, the country's economy showed its resilience in the face of domestic as well as external challenges. Real GDP grew by 7.4% in 2014, in comparison to the growth of 7.2% in 2013. The economy was driven by domestic consumption expenditure that constitutes the largest share of aggregate demand, while investments, particularly on construction, also provided an impetus to the economic expansion during the year. On the production side the Industry and Services sectors continued to perform well, while adverse weather conditions dampened the performance of the Agriculture sector during the year. Inflation remained at single digit levels for the sixth consecutive year, with year-on-year and annual average inflation declining to 2.1% and 3.3%, respectively, by end 2014, from 4.7% and 6.9%, respectively at end 2013.

Non-Bank Financial Sector

Licensed Finance Company (LFC) and Specialised Leasing Company (SLC) sector asset growth moderated during 2014 due to lower demand for credit, particularly during the early part of the year. However, the demand for credit picked up during the second half of 2014. The lower interest rate scenario helped to improve credit demand and to maintain the rising non-performing loans at a manageable level. This sector comprised of 48 LFCs and 8 SLCs by end of 2014. During 2014, the LFC and SLC sector branch network expanded by 72 to 1132, out of which 47 were opened outside the Western Province.

Asset growth

The total asset base of the Non-Bank Financial Institutions (NBFI) grew by 18.9% in 2014 to LKR.853 bn compared to a growth of 20.3% in 2013. The main contributory factor for the expansion of the asset base was the growth in the accommodations portfolio and liquid assets.

Management Discussion & Analysis cont....

Accommodations recorded a modest growth of 16% to LKR. 641 bn as at end 2014, compared to a growth rate of 17.3% during 2013. Finance leases, hire purchases and secured advances were the major sources of accommodation accounting for 43%, 27% and 19%, respectively.

The investment portfolio of the sector, which comprised of equity and debt investments recorded a notable increase of 39.6% during 2014 to LKR. 42bn. Other assets mainly comprised of liquid assets, trading stocks and fixed assets showed a steady growth mainly on account of increased liquid assets in the form of Treasury Bills.

Liabilities

The major source of funding for NBFIs is deposits and borrowings, and deposits increased to 48.5% in 2014 from 47% in 2013, while the borrowings decreased to 25.4% in 2014 from 26.8% in 2013 indicating the shift towards lower cost of short term deposits from borrowings. The deposits grew by 22.7% to LKR.414 bn as at the end of 2014, compared to a 32.7% growth in 2013. This was mainly due to higher deposit rates offered by LFCs compared to banks in the current lower interest rate regime. The total borrowings in the sector reached LKR. 217 bn, an increase of 12.9% compared to the growth rate of 9.3% in 2013.



Company Overview

The Company is engaged in Leasing, Hire Purchase, Fixed Deposits and Personal Loans and has completed its third successful year. Ideal Finance Limited provides comprehensive financial services to its increasing customer base through it's branch network island wide. Backed strongly by it's sister company Ideal Motors (Private) Limited

, the Company had earned a good brand image and a reputation for ethical business practice. Small & Medium Enterprises (SMEs) are the Company's core target group and gains were made during the year in providing valuable financial assistance to aspiring entrepreneurs, despite the negative impact on growth potential of the company due to consolidation programme.

Strategy

There was a cohesive effort infused into every feature of our operations, processes and systems that enabled us to ensure that our strategic direction for 2014facilitated to overcome the envisaged challenges, exploit the opportunities and work on initiatives that helped create a sustainable business. The initial business model for 2013 was that primarily focuses on supporting the Small and Medium Enterprises (SME) sector, and improving profitability of the company, while prudently managing cost.

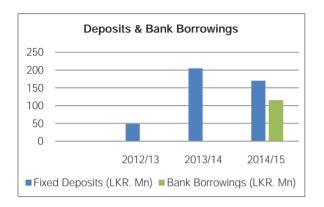
Lending

Ideal Finance Limited (IFL)'s Hire Purchase, Leasing & Loan business is centered on the SME sector. The Company has strong links with the SME sectors across demographic considerations over the last two years and these were strengthened further over the year under review. Our relationship with our SME customers has resulted in deriving key insights into maintaining and increasing our customer base by translating this knowledge into key deliverables to delight the customer. The fact that many of our branch staff hail from the surrounding areas implies that they are aware of cultural nuances that could make a difference between a disgruntled or a satisfied customer. Company's lending portfolio mainly comprises of leases, hire purchases and loans which amount to LKR. 556mn, LKR. 158mn and LKR. 23mn respectively. The total lending portfolio stands at LKR. 737mn which is an increase of 22% compared to LKR. 604mn in 2013.

Deposits and Bank Borrowings

The efforts in developing a steady deposit base have shown positive results as we closed the financial year securing a deposit base of LKR. 170mn.IFL negotiated a four year loan from Bank of Ceylon in year 2014 and has currently drawn down LKR. 125mn.

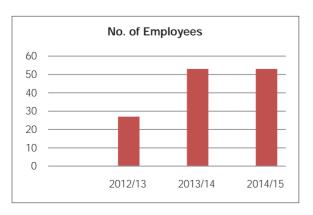


Human Resources

Corporate Governance Report

Corporate Governance

Corporate Governance is defined as the system of law and sound approaches by which corporations are directed and controlled focusing on the internal and external corporate structures with the intention of monitoring the actions of management and directors and thereby mitigating agency risks which may stem from the misdeeds of corporate officers.

The Board of Directors is responsible for the governance of the Company and has placed significant prominence on developing rules, structures, policies and processes to ensure integrity and transparency in all of the Company's dealings and making the best effort in achieving performance and quality profits. We have continuously refined our structure and systems to ensure governance on the lines as defined, aware at all times that we are accountable to our stakeholders and the general public.

This statement describes the application of the Corporate Governance practices carried out within the Company during the year under review.

Board of Directors

The Board is the apex body of Ideal Finance Limited that carries the responsibilities of directing the Company. The responsibilities of the Board includes making an accurate assessment of the Company's position, taking strategic decisions, holding regular meetings of the Board and Board Sub Committees, ensuring good governance and overseeing the risk management of the Company.

Composition and Independence

The Board comprises of nine (09) members, eight (08) of whom, including the Chairman, are Non-Executive Directors with the balance of skills and experience appropriate for the business carried out by the Company.

The Board has determined that three(03) Non-Executive Directors, namely, Mr. Hiran De Alwis, Mr. Ajith Dias and Dr. Suren Peter are' Independent' as per the criteria set out in the Finance Companies (Corporate Governance) Direction No. 3 of 2008.

Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

The functions of the Chairman and the Chief Executive Officer are separated, with a clear distinction drawn between responsibilities, which ensure a balance of power and authority.

Mr. Nalin J Welgama is the Chairman of the Board of Directors and Mr. Duminda M Weerasekare serves as the Chief Executive Officer of the Company.

Tenure, Retirement and Re-election of Directors

There shall be a formal, considered and transparent procedure for the appointment of new Directors to the Board.

If a director resigns or is removed from office, the Board shall announce to the shareholders and notify the Director of the Department of Supervision of Non-Bank Financial Institutions of the Central Bank of Sri Lanka with the reasons for such removal or resignation.

The provisions of the Company's Articles of Association also require Directors appointed by the Board to hold office until the next Annual General Meeting and seek appointment by the shareholders at such a meeting.

Board Meetings

The results of the Company are regularly considered and monitored against the budgets at Board meetings at which a standard agenda is discussed together with any other matter which requires the attention of the Board.

The Board meets once a month and wherever necessary, special meetings of the Board are held.

Risk Management Report

Introduction

As a financial service provider Ideal Finance Limited (IFL) currently offers various ranges of financial products such as Leases, Loans, Hire Purchases, Fixed Deposits, Real Estate and Mortgage Loans. The Company invested in infrastructure for gold loans and also planning to expand its operations by opening new branches in potential areas.

The Board of directors of the company is very keen on active risk management practices. Therefore all possible risk mitigation strategies are introduced and implemented in order to make sure that company operates at its best while minimising it's financial and business risks.

The Integrated Risk Management Committee (IRMC) is a board appointed committee which meets quarterly to discuss and evaluate the present risk management procedures, the risk levels that the company is currently facing and the risks that company will have to face in the future. Integrated Risk Management report will be presented to the committee and the directors will analyse the report to evaluate whether the risk mitigation strategies are adequate for the business.

An effective risk management strategy will ensure that all applicable risks to the company will be identified and evaluated at an early stage and necessary measures will be taken in order to avoid and reduce the impact of the risk.

Risk Management Process

Managing the risk within the company takes place in different stages. This involves



Under Risk Identification, all risk categories and the sub categories that the business is exposed are identified. If the business environment is changing or new products are going to be introduced, all risks involved have to be identified. Whenever IFL is planning to introduce a new product to the market, the inherent risks shall be identified in order to avoid facing unexpected and adverse outcomes.

Once the risk is identified it will be analysed and measured by using both quantitative and qualitative techniques. Thereafter necessary actions shall be taken in order to manage the risks and reduce the impact of risk occurrence. These will then be monitored to avoid the accumulation of risks. Subsequently all findings shall be reported to the Board.

Key Risks Faced by the Company

The Company is exposed to the following risks due to the nature of the business we are into and as a result of the macro economic conditions of which majority are inherent.

- Credit risk / Default risk
- · Liquidity risk
- Interest rate risk
- Currency risk
- Collateral risk
- Strategic risk
- Operational risk
- · Regulatory risk
- Reputational risk

Risk Management Report cont....

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the largest risk that the company is exposed which can be mainly categorised in to two parts namely default risk and concentration risk.

Default risk

Default risk is the risk that arises due to customers being unable to meet their debt obligation. The company has a well-defined credit procedure in place to mitigate the credit risk that arises when doing day to day business activities. This includes credit appraisal, credit operations, credit approval and monitoring and recovering debt. IFL obtains sufficient collateral as security in case of a default of payment by borrower as all non performing facilities are analysed periodically to make sure that the company maintains a very low non-performing loan ratio (NPL ratio).

The Company had a NPL ratio of 0.97% where average industry NPL ratio is approximately 6.9%.

Concentration Risk

Concentration risk occurs when the facilities are given to a single counter party, Industry or geographical area. The company has set prudential limits on maximum exposure which is being reviewed periodically as well as single borrower limits defined by the Finance Companies Direction No 4 of 2006 issued by Central Bank of Sri Lanka.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that arises when the company does not have enough funds to meet its obligations which arises due to unmatched maturities of assets and liabilities. Company has a liquidity management policy where the primary objective is to ensure adequate funding for its day to day business activities. Furthermore, the company maintains the statutory liquid assets ratio at its required level as a method of measure and control of liquidity risk.

Company takes following precautionary measures in order to maintain a healthy liquidity position.

 Prepares an annual budget and identifies the average amount of money needed to finance facilities.

- Identify the cumulative gap of current year assets and liabilities.
- Identify the amount of unpredicted cash requirements that arose during the past 6 months.
- Identify the cash flow arising from interest earning assets.

Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk arises due to adverse and unanticipated movements in future interest rate which arises due to granting of credit facilities and accepting deposits. Out of the several factors that gives rise to interest rate risk the main two types of risks that IFL is exposed to includes,

- Term structure risk which arises due to mismatches in the maturities of assets and liabilities
- Basis risk which arises due to differences in the bases of interest rates.

Company perform periodic reviews of the interest rates by

- Analysing the past fluctuation of interest rate patterns and forecasting the Interest rate movements based on past trends.
- Monitoring other market factors. E.g. liquidity of the market, T Bill rate, etc.
- Identifying the gap analysis of Interest earning assets & Interest Paying Liabilities.
- Identifying the effect on Net Interest Income

Currency risk

Currency risk is a form of financial risk that arises from the potential change in the exchange rate of one currency against another. IFL is exposed to Currency Risk provided the Exchange Rate Risk is not transferred at the time of transacting. Company monitors the fluctuation of USD/LKR and USD/JPY exchange rates and forecast Exchange rate trends based on the past behaviour of the two currencies.

Collateral risk

Collateral risk is the risk of the value of security held, being not sufficient to meet the capital outstanding of a facility in the event of a default of payment by the customer. When Risk Management Report cont....

IFL grants credit facility to its customers, company ensures that the value of the collateral held as security is sufficient to meet the facility amount in case of a default of payment by borrower. In order to mitigate the collateral risk the company takes the following measures.

- · Physically verify the asset before granting facilities.
- · Checks the absolute ownership of the asset.
- Obtain a valuation report from a CBSL approved valuer.
- Obtain a full Insurance policy for the asset.

Strategic risk

Strategic risk can be seen as the impact on the company's earnings or equity due to the business decisions taken by the Company, improper implementation of business strategies or lack of responsiveness to industry changes. All strategic decisions are taken at board level where the Board obtains professional expertise advice as and when required. IFL has appropriately addressed the Strategic Risk exposure of the Company throughout the period thus minimizing the level of risk exposure.

Operational risk

Operational risk is the risk of financial losses due to the failure or inadequacy of internal processes or systems, human error or external events. The sources of Operational Risk includes People, Internal Processes, Systems and External events. Operational risk can be mainly analysed under fraud risk and technological risk. IFL manages operational risks by maintaining a comprehensive system

of internal controls and using technology to automate processes and reduce manual errors. The company has in place a process of continuous internal audit utilizing the services of Baker Tilly LKA Chartered Accountants.

Regulatory risk

Regulatory risk is the financial loss and damage to the reputation of the company that arises from failing to comply with the laws and regulations applicable. As the financial industry is highly regulated and is continuously monitored for compliance by the regulatory bodies. Company has set internal deadlines and monitor whether CBSL reports are submitted on time. Also company make sure all statutory payments are paid before the due date.

Reputational risk

Reputation risk exposure of IFL is minimal given the implementation of comprehensive risk management strategies and procedure. Reputation risk cannot be managed in isolation from other forms of Risks, since all risks can have an impact on reputation, which in turn can impact the IFL brand, earnings and capital. Credit, liquidity, interest rate, operational, and regulatory risks of IFL are managed effectively in order to safeguard the company's reputation as IFL has identified company's reputation is a valuable business asset in its own right, essential to optimize shareholder value.

Statement of Directors' Responsibilities for Financial Reporting

The Directors are required by the Companies Act, No. 7 of 2007 to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the statement of affairs of the Company as at the end of the financial year and the income and expenditure of the Company for the financial year.

The Directors are also responsible to ensure that the financial statements comply with any regulations made under the Companies Act which specifies the form and content of financial statements and any other requirements which apply to the Company's financial statements under any other law.

The Directors consider that the financial statements presented in this Annual Report have been prepared using appropriate accounting policies, consistently applied and supported by reasonable and prudent judgments and estimates and in compliance with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards, Companies Act, No. 7 of 2007, Sri Lanka Accounting and Auditing Standards Act, No. 15 of 1995 and Finance Business Act No. 42 of 2011 and the relevant Directions issued in respect of Registered Finance Companies.

The Directors are responsible for ensuring that the Company keeps sufficient accounting records, which disclose the financial position of the Company with reasonable accuracy and enable them to ensure that the financial statements have been prepared and presented as aforesaid. The process is regularly reviewed by the Board. The Board is of the view that the system of Internal Control over Financial Reporting in place, is adequate to provide reasonable assurance regarding the reliability of Financial Reporting, and that the preparation of Financial Statements for external purposes is in accordance with relevant accounting principles and regulatory requirements.

The management assists the Board in the implementation of the Board's policies and procedures pertaining to Internal Control over Financial Reporting. The management has started the process of documenting the system of Internal Control over Financial Reporting. In assessing the Internal Control System over Financial Reporting, identified officers of the Company collated all procedures and controls that are connected with significant accounts and disclosures of the Financial Statements of the Company. These in turn are being observed and checked by the Internal Auditors of the Company for suitability of design and effectiveness on an on-going basis.

Company adopted the new Sri Lanka Accounting Standards comprising LKAS and SLFRS. Processes applied to adopt the said accounting standards were strengthened during the year 2013 based on the feedback received from the External Auditors, Internal Auditors, Regulators and the Board Audit Committee.

Progressive improvements on processes to comply with new Sri Lanka Accounting Standards requirements of recognition measurement, classification and disclosure are being made whilst some processes were not fully completed at the reporting date. In particular, due to time constraints, areas with respect to the related party transactions, commitment and contingencies, loan granting monitoring and recovering, real state, taxation, compliance with regulation, treasury and IT controls were being implemented as at the reporting date. Company was also in the process of updating relevant procedure manuals pertaining to the new Sri Lanka Accounting Standards requirements.

CONFIRMATION

Based on the above processes, the Board confirms that the Financial Reporting System of the Company has been designed to provide reasonable assurance regarding the reliability of Financial Reporting and the preparation of Financial Statements for external purposes and has been done in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards and regulatory requirements of the Central Bank of Sri Lanka.

EXTERNAL AUDITORS CERTIFICATION

The External Auditors have submitted a certification on the process adopted by the Directors on the system of internal controls over financial reporting. The matters addressed by the External Auditors in this respect, are being looked into.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

1.1 General

IDEAL Investment Limited is a limited liability company, incorporated on 24 January 2012 under companies Act No.7 of 2007 and then changed the name as IDEAL Finance Limited on 12 March 2012 and domiciled in Sri Lanka. The registered office of the company is situated at No.299, Dr. Colvin R De. Silva Mawatha (Union Place), Colombo 02.

IDEAL Finance Limited is licensed by Monetary Board of The Central Bank of Sri Lanka under the Finance Business Act No. 42 of 2011, and also registered under the Finance Leasing Act No.56 of 2000.

1.2 Principal Activities and Nature of Operations

During the year, the principal activities of the Company were Acceptance of Deposits, Granting Lease, Hire Purchase and Micro Credit Facilities.

1.3 Parent Entity and Ultimate Parent Entity

The Company does not have an Identifiable parent of its own. Further company does not have any investments in the form of subsidiary, joint venture or associate.

1.4 Date of Authorization for Issue

The financial statements of IDEAL Finance Limited for the year ended 31 March 2015 were authorized for issue in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Directors on 12 May2015.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Basis of preparation

2.1.1 Statement of Compliance

The Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Comprehensive Income, Statement of Changes in Equity and Cash Flow Statement, together with Accounting Policies and Notes, ('Financial Statements'),as at 31 March 2015 and for the year then ended, have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards comprising of Sri Lanka Financial Reporting Standards & Lanka Accounting Standards(hereafter referred as "SLFRS"), laid down by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka and in compliance with the requirements of the Companies Act No. 07 of 2007 and amendments thereto.

2.1.2 Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for available-for-sale investments.

2.1.3 Presentation of Financial Statements

In compliance with LKAS 01 on Presentation of Financial Statements, each material class of similar items are presented separately in the Financial Statements. Items of dissimilar nature or functions are presented separately, unless they are immaterial.

The company presents its Statements of Financial Position broadly in order of liquidity. An analysis regarding recovery or settlement within 12 months after the reporting date (current) and more than 12 months after the reporting date (non-current) is presented in Note 32.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Statement of the Financial Position only when there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realize the assets and settle the liability simultaneously. Income and expenses are not offset in the Statement of Comprehensive Income unless required or permitted by any accounting standard or interpretation, and as specifically disclosed in the accounting policies of the company.

2.1.4 Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in Sri Lanka

Rupees, except when otherwise is indicated. No adjustments have been made for inflationary factors.

2.1.5 Comparative Information

The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Company and, are consistent with those used in the previous year.

2.2 Use of significant accounting judgments, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of financial statements requires the application of certain critical accounting and assumptions relating to the future. Further, it requires the management of the company to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of the reporting period. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability in future periods.

Judgments

In the process of applying the Company's accounting policies, management has exercised judgment and estimates in determining the amounts recognized in the financial statements.

Estimates and assumptions

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The company based these assumptions and estimates on parameters available at the time financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, these may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of the company. Such changes are taken into consideration in the assumptions when they

occur. The most significant uses of judgments and estimates are as follows:

i. Taxation

The Company is subject to income tax. The Company recognized assets and liabilities for current and deferred taxes based on estimates of whether additional taxes will be due. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the amounts that were initially recorded, such differences will impact the income and deferred tax amounts in the period in which the determination is made.

ii. Useful life-time of the Property and equipment

The company reviews the residual values, useful lives and methods of depreciation of assets as at each reporting date. Judgment of the management is exercised in the estimation of these values, rates, methods and hence they are subject to uncertainty.

iii. Going Concern

The board has made an assessment of the company's ability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that it has the resources to continue in business for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, the board is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the company's ability to continue as a going concern and they do not intend either to liquidate or to cease operations of the company. Therefore, the financial statements continue to be prepared on the going concern basis...

iv. Impairment losses on loans and advances

The company review their individually significant loans and advances at each statement of financial position date to assess whether an impairment loss should be recorded in the statement of comprehensive income. In particular, judgment of the management is required in estimation of the amount and timing of future cash flows when determining the impairment loss. These estimates

are based on assumptions about a number of factors and actual results may differ, resulting in future changes to the impairment allowance.

Loan and advances that have been assessed individually and found to be not impaired and all individually insignificant loans and advances are then assessed collectively, in groups of assets with similar risk characteristics, to determine whether provision should be made due to incurred loss events for which there is objective evidence, but the effects of which are not yet evident. The collective assessment takes in to account data from the loan portfolio (such as levels of arrears, credit utilization etc), and judgments on the effect of concentrations of risks and economic data (including level of unemployment, inflation, interest rates, exchange rates.)

V. Deferred tax assets

Deferred tax assets are recognized in respect of tax losses to the extent it is possible that future taxable profits will be available against which such tax losses can be set off. Judgments is required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognized, based on the likely timing and level of future taxable profits, together with the future tax-planning strategies.

Vi. Defined Benefit Plan Obligation

The cost of the defined benefit pension plan is determined using an actuarial valuation. The actuarial valuation involves making assumptions about discount rates, future salary increases, and mortality rates. Due to the long term nature of these plans, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainty. Assumptions used are disclosed in Note 25.

2.3 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial Statements are set out below.

2.3.1 Financial Instruments

2.3.1. Initial recognition and subsequent measurement

Financial assets within the scope of LKAS 39 are classified as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, loans and receivables, held-to-maturity investments, available-for-sale financial assets, or as derivatives designated as hedging instruments in an effective hedge, as appropriate. The Company determines the classification of its financial assets at initial recognition. The Company's financial assets include cash and bank balances, placement with banks and other financial institutions, lease rentals receivable and stock out on hire, loan stock and other financial assets.

Financial liabilities within the scope of LKAS 39 are classified as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, or as derivatives designated as hedging instruments in an effective hedge, as appropriate. The Company determines the classification of its financial liabilities at initial recognition. The Company's financial liabilities include, due to bank, due to the other customers and other financial liabilities

a) Date of Recognition

All financial assets and liabilities are initially recognized on the trade date, i.e. the date that the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. This includes regular way trades, purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame generally established by regulation or convention in the market place.

b) Initial measurement of financial instruments

The classification of financial instruments at initial recognition depends on their purpose and characteristics and the management's intention in acquiring them. All financial instruments are measured initially at their fair value plus transaction

costs, except in the case of financial assets and financial liabilities recorded at fair value through profit or loss.

c) Subsequent measurement of financial instruments

i The subsequent measurement of financial assets depends on their classification as described below:

Available-for-sale financial investments

Available-for-sale investments include unquoted equity. Equity investments classified as available-for-sale are those which are neither classified as held for trading nor designated at fair value through profit or loss. The company has not designated any loans or receivables as available-for-sale.

initial measurement, available-for-sale financial investments are subsequently measured at fair value. Unrealized gains and losses are recognized directly in equity (Other comprehensive income) in the available-for- sale reserve. When the investment is disposed of, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognized in equity is recognized in the statement of comprehensive income in 'Net Gain/ (Loss) From Financial Investments'. Where the company holds more than one investment in the same security, they are deemed to be disposed of on a first -in first-out basis. Dividends earned whilst holding available-for-sale financial investments are recognized in the statement of comprehensive income as 'net gain/ (Loss) from Financial Investments when the right of the payment has been established. The losses arising from impairment of such investments are recognized in the statement of comprehensive income in 'Impairment losses on financial investments' and removed from the Available-for-sale reserve.

Available - for - sale financial instrument which fair value is not reliably measurable are stated at cost.

Financial Assets Classified as Lease Rental Receivables, Stock out on Hire, Placement with Banks & Other Financial Institutions and

Other Financial Assets

This includes non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market, other than:

- Those that the company intends to sell immediately or in the near term and those that the company, upon initial recognition, designates as at fair value through profit or loss
- Those that the company, upon initial recognition, designates as available-for-sale

Those for which the company may not recover substantially all of its initial investment, other than because of credit deterioration.

After initial measurement, Financial Assets Classified as Lease Rental Receivables, Stock out on Hire, Placement with Banks & Other Financial Institutions and Other Financial Assets are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the Effective Interest Rate, less allowance for impairment. Amortized cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees and costs that are an integral part of the Effective Interest Rate. The amortization is included in Interest and similar income in the statement of comprehensive income. The losses arising from impairment are recognized in the statement of comprehensive income in 'Impairment for Loans and Other Losses' and Detailed under Note 14.

II. The subsequent measurement of financial liabilities depends on their classification as described below:

Loans and borrowings:

After initial recognition, interest bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method (EIR). Gains and losses are recognized in the statement of comprehensive income when the liabilities are derecognized as well as

through the effective interest rate method (EIR) amortization process.

2.3.1.2 Derecognition of Financial Assets and Liabilities

(i) Financial Assets

A financial asset (or, where applicable a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets) is derecognized when:

- The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired
- The Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a 'pass-through' arrangement and either:
- The company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset
 Or
- The company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset

When the Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, and has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset nor transferred control of the asset, the asset is recognized to the extent of the company's continuing involvement in the asset. In that case, the company also recognizes an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations that the company has retained.

Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount

of consideration that the company could be required to repay.

(ii) Financial liabilities

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. Where an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as a derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference between the carrying value of the original financial liability and the consideration paid is recognised in profit or loss.

2.3.1.3 Determination of Fair Value

The fair value for financial instruments traded in active markets at the reporting date is based on their quoted market price or dealer price quotations without any deduction for transaction costs. For all other financial instruments not traded in an active market, the fair value is determined by using appropriate valuation techniques. Valuation techniques include the discounted cash flow method, comparison with similar instruments for which market observable prices exists, pricing models and other relevant valuation models.

2.3.1.4 Impairment of Financial Assets

The Company assesses at each reporting date, whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. A financial asset or a group of financial assets is deemed to be impaired if, and only if, there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that have occurred after the initial recognition of the asset (an incurred loss event) and that loss event (or events) has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset or the group of financial assets that can be reliably estimated.

Evidence of impairment may include: indications that the borrower or a group of borrowers is experiencing significant financial difficulty; the probability that they will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; and where observable data indicates that there is a measurable decrease in the estimated future cash flows, such as changes in arrears or economic conditions that correlate with defaults

(i) Financial assets carried at amortised cost

For financial assets carried at amortised cost (such as amounts due from banks, loans and advances to customers as well as held to maturity investments), the company first assesses individually whether objective evidence of impairment exists for financial assets that are individually significant, or collectively for financial assets that are not individually significant. If the company determines that no objective evidence of impairment exists for an individually assessed financial asset, it includes the asset in a group of financial assets with similar credit risk characteristics and collectively assesses them for impairment. Assets that are individually assessed for impairment and for which an impairment loss is, or continues to be, recognised are not included in a collective assessment of impairment.

If there is objective evidence that an impairment loss has been incurred, the amount of the loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows (excluding future expected credit losses that have not yet been incurred). The carrying amount of the asset is reduced through the use of an allowance account and the amount of the loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income. Interest income continues to be accrued on the reduced carrying amount and is accrued using the rate of interest used to discount the future cash flows for the purpose of measuring the impairment loss. The interest income is recorded as part of Interest income.

Loans together with the associated allowance are written off when there is no realistic prospect of future recovery and all collateral has been realised or has been transferred to the company. If, in a subsequent year, the amount of the estimated impairment loss increases or decreases because of an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is increased or reduced by adjusting the allowance account. If a future write–off is later recovered, the recovery is credited to the 'Other Operating Income".

The present value of the estimated future cash flows is discounted at the financial asset's original Effective Interest Rate. If a loan has a variable interest rate, the discount rate for measuring any impairment loss is the current Effective Interest Rate. If the Company has reclassified trading assets to loans and advances, the discount rate for measuring any impairment loss is the new Effective Interest Rate determined at the reclassification date. The calculation of the present value of the estimated future cash flows of a collateralised financial asset reflects the cash flows that may result from foreclosure less costs for obtaining and selling the collateral, whether or not foreclosure is probable.

For the purpose of a collective evaluation of impairment, financial assets are grouped on the basis of the company's internal credit grading system, that considers credit risk characteristics such as asset type, industry, geographical location, collateral type, past-due status and other relevant factors. Future cash flows on a group of financial assets that are collectively evaluated for impairment are estimated on the basis of historical loss experience for assets with credit risk characteristics similar to those in the group. Historical loss experience is adjusted on the basis of current observable data to reflect the effects of current conditions on which the historical loss experience is based and to remove the effects of conditions in the historical period that do not exist currently.

Estimates of changes in future cash flows reflect, and are directionally consistent with, changes in related observable data from year to year (such as changes in unemployment rates, property prices, commodity prices, payment status, or other factors that are indicative of incurred losses in the group and their magnitude). The methodology and assumptions used for estimating future cash flows are reviewed regularly to reduce any differences between loss estimates and actual loss experience.

(ii) Available-for-sale financial investments

For available-for-sale financial investments, the company assesses at each reporting date whether there is objective evidence that an investment is impaired.

In the case of debt instruments classified as available-for-sale, the company assesses individually whether there is objective evidence of impairment based on the same criteria as financial assets carried at amortised cost.

However, the amount recorded for impairment is the cumulative loss measured as the difference between the amortised cost and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on that investment previously recognised in the statement of comprehensive income . Future interest income is based on the reduced carrying amount and is accrued using the rate of interest used to discount the future cash flows for the purpose of measuring the impairment loss. The interest income is recorded as part of Interest and similar income. If, in a subsequent period, the fair value of an equity instrument increases and the increase can be objectively related to a credit event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised in the statement of comprehensive income, the impairment loss is reversed through the statement of comprehensive income.

In the case of equity investments classified as available-for-sale, objective evidence would also

include a 'significant' or 'prolonged' decline in the fair value of the investment below its cost. The company treats 'significant' generally as 20% and 'prolonged' generally as greater than six months. Where there is evidence of impairment, the cumulative loss measured as the difference between the acquisition cost and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on that investment previously recognised in the statement of comprehensive income – is removed from equity and recognised in the statement of comprehensive income. Impairment losses on equity investments are not reversed through the statement of comprehensive income; increases in the fair value after impairment are recognised in other comprehensive income.

2.3.1.5 Offsetting Financial Instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the statement of Financial Position if and only if, there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

2.3.2 Lease

The determination of whether an arrangement is a lease, or contains a lease, is based on the substance of the arrangement and requires an assessment of whether the fulfillment of the arrangement is dependent on the use of a specific asset or assets and the arrangement conveys a right to use the asset.

2.3.2.1 Operating Lease

Company as a lessee

Leases that do not transfer to the company substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the leased items are operating leases. Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense in the statement of comprehensive income on a straight-line basis over the lease term. Contingent rental payable is recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

Company as a lessor

Leases where the company does not transfer substantially all of the risk and benefits of ownership of the asset are classified as operating leases. Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating operating leases are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognised over the lease term on the same basis as rental income. Contingent rents are recognised as revenue in the period in which they are earned.

2.3.2.2 Finance Lease

Company as a lessor

Assets leased to customers which transfer substantially all the risks and rewards associated with ownership other than legal title, are classified as 'Finance Lease". Amount receivables under finance lease are included under 'Lease Rentals Receivable and Stock Out on Hire' in the Statement of Financial Position after deduction of unearned lease income and accumulated impairment losses. When assets are held subject to a finance lease, the present value of the lease payments, discounted at the rate of interest implicit in the lease, is recognized as a receivable. The difference between the total payments receivable under the lease and the present value of the receivable is recognized as unearned finance income, which is allocated to accounting periods reflect a constant periodic rate of return.

2.3.3 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents as referred to in the cash flow statement comprises cash in hand, and amounts due from banks on demand or with an original maturity of three months or less.

2.3.4 Property, Plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost excluding the costs of day-to-day servicing, less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment in value. Changes in the expected useful life are accounted for by changing the amortisation

period or method, as appropriate, and treated as changes in accounting estimates.

Depreciation is calculated using the straightline method to write down the cost of property and equipment to their residual values over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

The depreciation method and residual values of assets are reviewed at each financial year-end and, if there has been a significant change in the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the asset, the method shall be changed to reflect the changed pattern.

Property plant & Equipment is derecognized on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the assets (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and carrying amount of the assets) is recognized in 'Other Operating Income' in the Statement of Comprehensive Income (Profit or Loss) in the year the asset is recognized.

2.3.5 Intangible assets

The company's other intangible assets include the value of computer software. An intangible asset is recognised only when its cost can be measured reliably and it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to it will flow to the company. Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses.

The useful lives of intangible assets are assessed to be either finite or indefinite. Intangible assets with finite lives are amortised over the useful economic life. The amortisation period and the amortisation method for an intangible asset with a finite useful life are reviewed at least at each financial year end. Changes in the expected useful life or the expected pattern of consumption of future economic benefits embodied in the asset are accounted for by changing the amortisation period or method, as appropriate, and they are treated as changes in accounting estimates. The amortisation expense on intangible assets with finite lives is presented as a separate line item in the statement of comprehensive income.

Computer System software is amortised over :10 vears.

2.3.6 Other Assets

All other assets are stated at cost less accumulated impairment losses.

2.3.7 Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

2.3.8 Impairment of non-financial assets

The company assesses at each reporting date whether there is an indication that an asset may be impaired. If any indication exists, or when annual impairment testing for an asset is required, the company estimates the asset's recoverable amount. An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's or cash generating unit's fair value less costs to sell and its value in use. Where the carrying amount of an asset or cash generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount.

In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. In determining fair value less costs to sell, an appropriate valuation model is used. These calculations are corroborated by valuation multiples, quoted share prices for publicly traded subsidiaries or other available fair value indicators.

An assessment is made at each reporting date as to whether there is any indication that previously recognised impairment losses may no longer exist or may have decreased. If such indication exists, the company estimates the asset's or cash generating unit's recoverable amount. A previously recognized impairment loss is reversed only if there has been a change in the assumptions used to determine the asset's recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised. The reversal is limited so that the carrying amount of the asset does not exceed its recoverable amount, nor exceeds the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation, had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. Such reversal is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

2.3.9 Employee Retirement Benefits Defined Contribution Plan Costs

Defined contribution plan is a post- employment benefit plan under which an entity pays fixed contributions into a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. Obligations for contributions to a defined contribution plan are recognized as a Personnel Expenses in the Statement of comprehensive income in the periods during which services are rendered by employees. Employees are eligible for employees' Provident Fund and Employees Trust Fund Contributions in line with the respective Statutes and regulations. Accordingly, the company contributes 12% and 3% of gross emoluments of employees to Employees' Provident Fund and Employee Trust Fund respectively and is recognized as an expense under "Personnel Expenses".

Defined Benefit Plan Costs

A defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan other than a defined contribution plan. The liability recognized in the Statement of Financial Position in respect of defined benefit plan is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the reporting date. The defined benefit obligation is calculated using the projected unit credit method. The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash flows using interest rate that are denominated in the currency in which the benefit will be paid, and that have terms of maturity approximating to the terms of the liability.

Provision has been made in the Financial Statements for retiring gratuities from the first year of service for all employees, in conformity with LKAS 19-"Employee Benefits".

However, according to the payment of Gratuity Act No.12of 1983, the liability for payment to an employee arises only after the completion of 5 years continued services. The liability is not externally funded.

2.3.10 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. The expense relating to any provision is presented in the statement of comprehensive income net of any reimbursement.

2.3.11 Other Liabilities

Other liabilities are recorded at the cash value to be realized when settled.

2.3.12 Foreign currency translation

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially

recorded at the functional currency rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the functional currency rate of exchange at the statement of financial position date. All differences arising on non-trading activities are taken to 'Other operating income' in the income statement.

2.3.13 Recognition of income and expenses

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the revenue can be reliably measured. The following specific recognition criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised.

(i) Interest income and interest expense

For all financial instruments measured at amortised cost, interest bearing financial assets classified as available- for-sale and financial instruments designated at fair value through profit or loss, interest income or expense is recorded using the Effective Interest Rate. Effective Interest Rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument or a shorter period, where appropriate, to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. The calculation takes into account all contractual terms of the financial instrument (for example, prepayment options) and includes any fees or incremental costs that are directly attributable to the instrument and are an integral part of the Effective Interest Rate, but not future credit losses.

The carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability is adjusted if the company revises its estimates of payments or receipts. The adjusted carrying amount is calculated based on the original Effective Interest Rate and the change in carrying amount is recorded as 'Interest Income' for financial assets and Interest Expense for financial liabilities.

However, for a reclassified financial asset for which the company subsequently increases its estimates of future cash receipts as a result of increased recoverability of those cash receipts, the effect of that increase is recognised as an adjustment to the Effective Interest Rate from the date of the change in estimate.

Once the recorded value of a financial asset or a group of similar financial assets has been reduced due to an impairment loss, interest income continues to be recognised using the rate of interest used to discount the future cash flows for the purpose of measuring the impairment loss.

(ii) Fee and commission income

The company earns fee and commission income from a diverse range of services it provides to its customers. Fee income can be divided into the following two categories:

- Fee income earned from services that are provided over a certain period of time.
- Fees earned for the provision of services over a period of time are accrued over that period.
 These fees include commission income and service charges.

Fee income from providing transaction services

Fees arising from negotiating or participating in the negotiation of a transaction for a third party are recognised on completion of the underlying transaction. Fees or components of fees that are linked to a certain performance are recognised after fulfilling the corresponding criteria.

(iii) Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised when the company's right to receive the payment is established.

(iv) Expenditure Recognition

Expenses are recognized in profit or loss in the statement of comprehensive Income on the basis of a direct association between the cost incurred and the earning of specific items of income.

All expenditure incurred in the running of the business and in maintaining the property, plant and equipment in a state of efficiency has been charged to the statement of Comprehensive Income (Profit or loss). For the purpose of presentation of the statement of comprehensive Income, the "function of expenses" method has been adopted, on the basis that it presents fairly the element of the company's performance.

2.3.14 Taxes

a Current Tax

The provision for the income tax is based on the elements of the income and expenditure as reported in the Financial Statements and computed in accordance with the provisions of the Inland Revenue Act No.10 of 2006 as amended subsequently.

Current income tax assets and liabilities for the current and prior years are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

b. Deferred Tax

Deferred tax is provided on temporary differences at the reporting date between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes. Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all taxable temporary differences.

Deferred tax assets are recognized for all deductible temporary differences, carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses, to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credit and unused tax losses can be utilized.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the

extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilized. Unrecognized deferred tax assets are reassessed at each reporting date and are recognized to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profit will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

c. Value Added Tax on Financial Services

Value Added Tax on Financial Services is calculated at the rate of 12% in accordance with the provisions of the Value Added Tax Act No. 14 of 2002 and amendments thereto.

2.3.15 Related Party Transactions

Disclosure has been made in respect of the transactions in which one party has the liability to control or exercise significant influence over the financial and operating policies/ decisions of the other, irrespective of whether a price is being charged.

2.3.16 Event Occurring After the Reporting Date

All the material events after the reporting date of the statement of Financial Position have been considered and appropriate adjustments/disclosures have been made in Note 34 to the Financial Statements.

2.3.17 Accounting Standards Issued but not Effective As Reporting Date

Standards issued but not yet effective up to the date of issuance of the financial statements are set out below. The company will adopt these standards when they become effective. Pending a detailed review the financial impact is not reasonably estimable as at the date of publication of these financial statements.

(i) SLFRS 9 -Financial Instruments:

Classification and Measurement

SLFRS 9, as issued reflects the first phase of work on replacement of LKAS 39 and applies to classification and measurement of financial assets and liabilities. SLFRS 9 will be effective for financial periods beginning on or after 01 January 2015.

(ii) SLFRS 14 -Regulatory Deferral Accounts

The scope of this standard is limited to first-time adopters of SLFRS that already recognise regulatory deferral account balances in their financial statements. Consequently, the financial statements of rate regulated entities that already apply SLFRS, or that do not otherwise recognise such balances, will not be affected by this standard. This standard is effective for the annual periods beginning on or after 01 January 2016.

(iii) SLFRS 15 -Revenue from Contracts with Customers

SLFRS 15 establishes a comprehensive framework for determining whether, how much and when revenue is recognised. It replaces existing revenue recognition guidance, including LKAS 18 Revenue, LKAS 11 Construction Contracts and IFRIC 13 Customer Loyalty Programmes. This standard is effective for the annual periods beginning on or after 01 January 2017.

36. CAPITAL

The Company maintains capital in order to cover risks inherent in the business and meet the capital adequacy requirements of Central Bank of Sri Lanka . The adequacy of the Company's capital is monitored based on the measures, rules and ratios adopted by Central Bank of Sri Lanka.

36.1 Capital Management

The primary objective of Company's capital management policy is to ensure that the Company complies with externally imposed capital requirements and healthy capital ratios in order to support its business and to maximize shareholders' value.

37. RISK MANAGEMENT

37.1 Introduction

Risk is inherent in the company's activities, but is managed through a process of ongoing identification, measurement and monitoring, subject to risk limits and other controls. This process of risk management is critical to the company's continuing profitability and each individual within the company is accountable for the risk exposures relating to his or her responsibilities.

Risk Management Framework

The Board of Directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework. The Board has delegated its authority to Integrated Risk Management Committee (IRMC) which is responsible for developing and monitoring Company's risk management policies. The Committee is headed by an Independent Non-Executive Director and is comprised of Executive and Non-Executive Directors and Officers performing Executive functions. Meetings of IRMC are held regularly, and the Board of Directors are duly updated of its activities.

Risk Measurement & Reporting

Monitoring and controlling risks is primarily performed based on policies, limits & thresholds established by the Company. These limits reflect the business strategy and market environment of the Company as well as the level of risk that the Company is willing to accept.

37.2 Credit Risk - Default Risk

Credit risk is risk arise due to the uncertainty in counter party's ability to meet its obligations. The risk of loss of principal or loss of a financial reward stemming from a borrower's failure to repay a loan or otherwise meet a contractual obligation.

37.3 LIQUIDITY RISK & FUNDING MANAGEMENT

Liquidity risk refers to the possibility of Company not having sufficient cash to meet its payment obligations. This arises primarily due to mismatches in the maturity profile of Company's assets and liabilities. Adequate liquidity is critical to meet the Company's financial commitment and to accommodate additional funding needs of the growing business volumes

The Company's primary objective in liquidity risk management is to ensure adequate funding for its businesses throughout market cycles.

Furthermore the Company maintains the statutory liquid assets ratio at its required level as a method to measure and control the liquidity risk.

37.4 INTEREST RATE RISK

Interest rate risk is a key constitute of the market risk exposure of the Company due to adverse and unanticipated movements in future interest rate which arises from core business activities; granting of credit facilities, accepting deposits and issuing debt instruments.

Due to the nature of operations of the Company, the impact of interest rate risk is mainly on the earnings of the Company rather than the market value of portfolios. Several factors give rise to interest rate risk; among these are term structure risk, which arises due to the mismatches in the maturities of assets and liabilities; basis risk which is the threat to income arises due to differences in the bases of interest rates.

Excessive movements in market interest rate could result in severe volatility to Company's net interest income and net interest margin. Company's exposure to interest rate risk is primarily associated with factors such as;

Non-Performing Ioan (NPL)Ratio

The net Non-Performing Loans as a percentage of the total loan portfolio.

Liquid Assets

Assets that are held in cash or in a form that can be converted to cash readily, such as deposits with other banks, Bills of Exchange, Treasury Bills.

Provision for Bad Debts

Amounts set aside against possible losses on financial leases, hire purchases, advances and other credit facilities according to the Finance Companies Direction 3 of 2006.

Materiality

The relative significance of a transaction or an event the omission or misstatement of which could influence the economic decisions of users of financial statements.

Net Assets Value per Ordinary Share

Shareholders' funds excluding Preference Shares divided by the number of ordinary shares in issue.

Risk Weighted Assets

On Balance Sheet Assets and the credit equivalent of off Balance Sheet Assets multiplied by the relevant risk weighting factors.

Segmental Analysis

Analysis of financial information by segments of an enterprise specifically, the different industries and the different geographical areas in which it operates.

Repurchase Agreement

Contract to sell and subsequently repurchase securities at a specified date and price.

Return on Average Equity (ROE)

Net income, less preference share dividends if any, expressed as a percentage of average ordinary shareholders' equity.

Revenue Reserve

Reserves set aside for future distribution and investment.

Shareholders' Funds

Total of issued and fully paid share capital and capital and revenue reserves.

Net Interest Income

The difference between income earned from interest earning assets and costincurred on interest bearing liabilities.

Non-Performing Loans

Loan advances and hire purchase/lease finance of which interest or capital is in arrears six months or more.

Prudence

Inclusion of a degree of caution in the exercise of judgment needed in making the estimates required under conditions of uncertainty, such that assets or income are not overstated and liabilities or expenses are not understated.

Return on Average Assets(RoA)

Profit After Tax divided by the average assets.

Substance over Form

The consideration that the accounting treatment and the presenting in financial statements of transactions and the events should be governed by their substance and financial reality and not merely by legal form.

Tier I Capital

Core capital representing permanent shareholders' equity and reserves created or increased by appropriations of retained earnings or other surpluses.

Tier II Capital

Supplementary capital representing revaluation reserves, general provision sand other capital instruments which combine certain characteristics of equity and debt such as hybrid capital instruments and subordinated term debts.

Value Added

Value of wealth created by providing financial and other related services less the cost of providing such services.

Debt to Equity Ratio

Long term Borrowings of the Company including Debentures divided by shareholders funds.

Interest Cover

Earnings before interest and taxes divided by interest cost.

Liquid Assets Ratio

Liquid Assets divided by public Deposits.

Capital Adequacy Ratios

The relationship between capital and the risk weighted assets as prescribed by the Central Bank of Sri Lanka developed by modifying international best practice son maintenance of capital for financial institutions, to suit the local requirements.

Interest in suspense

Interest suspended on non-performing contracts without recognizing to the Income.

Earnings per Share

Net profit after tax divided by the number of ordinary shares in issue.

Deferred Tax

Sum set aside in the financial statements for taxation that may become payable /receivable in a financial year other than the current financial year.

Related Parties

Parties where one party has the ability to control the other party or exercise significant influence over the other party in making financial and operating decisions.
